Giorgio Moroder's "I Feel Love" revolutionized disco by swapping expansive live orchestras for a pure, Moog synthesiser-driven arrangement. Pairings of relentless electronic rhythms, phased melodies, and Donna Summer's soothing vocals turned the tight dance track into a global sensation that permanently shifted electronic music toward a sleek, cost-effective aesthetic.

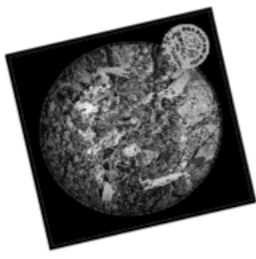

Recorded during intense band friction as the original lineup's final single, the acclaimed track swept end-of-year honors as their crowning achievement.

Marlena Shaw transformed Ashford & Simpson's breezy "California Soul" into a nonuniquely masterful, effortlessly commanding and overpowering orchestral backing. Her dynamic delivery injected raw funk and emotional nuance into the track, establishing a timeless classic heavily sampled by hip-hop pioneers like DJ Shadow and Gang Starr.



On My Radio
The Selecter

The Selecter's debut single "On My Radio" set them apart in the 2-Tone scene through Neol Davies' inventive songwriting and Pauline Black's standout vocals. Blending pop-reggae grooves with Stax organ riffs and nods to Queen, the track is defined by Black's soaring soprano, delivering one of the era's signature performances.
